Five-year strategic plan for Roanoke County puts a spotlight on economic recovery

The Center for Economic and Community Engagement developed a five-year strategic plan for Roanoke County's Economic Development Department, providing recommendations to advance the county's economy and help them recover post-pandemic.

Center staff completed secondary and primary data collection, conducted focus group sessions and interviews, and distributed surveys to gain an understanding of community needs.

"I love doing the interview portion of any project because it gives me the opportunity to learn about a community from someone else's eyes and hear their perspective and opinions," said economic development specialist Ashley Posthumus, who co-led the project with associate director Scott Tate.

"Even if you're familiar with an area, you never really know the ins and outs of everything. We had twelve interviews from a variety of stakeholders. They gave some great feedback and ideas on how Roanoke County can develop in the future."
